LICENSE VERIFICATION

The cost to verify your license to another state board is \$30.00. You will save time by sending a cashiers check or money order payable to “**Treasurer, State of Ohio**”. Your request cannot be processed without this fee. The appropriate forms must be enclosed to facilitate processing. Requests should be forwarded to the OTPTAT Board, 77 South High Street 16TH Floor, Columbus, OH 43266-0317. Processing takes approximately three weeks.

SPOT CHECKS

To assure consumer protection, the enforcement staff conducts random/unannounced inspections of physical therapy personnel. These visits are a proactive approach to affirm compliance of Ohio laws and rules and include, but are not limited to: verifying the credentials of physical therapy personnel, reviewing patient documentation of physical therapy services, verifying proper supervision of unlicensed supportive

and other assistive physical therapy personnel, and checking the display of wall certificates. Spot check information is reviewed by the Physical Therapy Investigative Committee each month and a follow-up letter is sent to the licensee. The Committee takes this opportunity to clarify any misinterpretation of the law, and makes any necessary recommendations for change.

USE OF MEDICATION BY PHYSICAL THERAPISTS AND PHYSICAL THERAPIST ASSISTANTS

House Bill 585 was signed by Governor Taft which gives physical therapists and physical therapist assistants statutory authority to administer a topical drug or medication. The bill will become effective April 9, 2001. Section 4755.40(A) of the Ohio Revised Code now states in part "...physical therapy means the evaluation and treatment of a person by physical measures and the use of therapeutic exercises and rehabilitative procedures, with or without assistive devices, for the purpose of preventing, correcting, or alleviating any disability. If performed by a person who or that is adequately trained, physical therapy includes the design, fabrication, revision, education and instruction in the use of various assistive devices including braces, splints, ambulatory, or locomotion devices, wheelchairs, prosthetics and orthotics. Physical therapy includes the administration of topical drugs that have been prescribed by a licensed health professional authorized to prescribe drugs, as defined in Section 4729.01 of the Ohio Revised Code..."

SUPERVISION OF HOME HEALTH AIDES

The changing health care environment, along with the needs of the consumers and the concerns of the licensees has guided the Section to revise its position on the supervision of home health aides. As a result, the Physical Therapy Section announces the following revised position statement regarding supervision of home health aides: When the physical therapist is serving as the case manager for the patient and there is no nurse involved in the patient's care, there is nothing in the PT Practice Act that would

prohibit the physical therapist from supervising the home health aide in provision of services external to physical therapy (i.e. bathing, grooming, assisting in the family patient care). If the physical therapist, at any time, delegates components of physical therapy services to the aide, then the law governing the supervision of unlicensed support staff would apply and the physical therapist must provide direct, on-site supervision and shall demonstrate their involvement in each treatment session provided by the aide.

The Physical Therapy Section has received a number of requests for waivers of continuing education that did not meet the deadline or contain the appropriate documentation as outlined by Ohio Administrative Rule 4755-23-09. In addition, a number of requests for waivers states that the physical therapist or physical therapist assistant needed a waiver because their employers no longer paid for CEU courses. It is the responsibility of the licensee to renew/maintain their license which includes meeting the requirements for CEU's. The fact that the employer does not pay for courses is not an acceptable reason for the PT Section to grant a waiver. Ohio Administrative Rule 4755-23-09 states in part, "...No waiver or extension of time shall be granted unless written application therefore shall be made on forms established by the Section and signed by the licensee; and/or in cases of sickness or illness, by a physician licensed in this state..."

All necessary appropriate documentation including but not limited to the application and physician statements shall be received by the Section NO LATER THAN OCTOBER FIRST, IN THE YEAR PRECEDING THE BIENNIAL RENEWAL. Therefore, those licensees whose renewal is January 31, 2002, would have requested a waiver by October 1, 2001.

RENEWAL ALERT!

All continuing education requirements must be completed by December 31st in the year preceding the biennial renewal (example: those whose license must be renewed by January 31, 2002, must complete their CEU's by December 31, 2001). All continuing education courses must have an Ohio Approval number. This number is obtained through the Ohio Physical Therapy Association at (614) 538-9613. In order to give the Association time to review and approve a course, you must allow 4-6 weeks to obtain an approval number.

Co-Signatures for Physical Therapist Assistants

All information completed by the physical therapist assistant shall be co-signed and dated by the physical therapist. The countersignature shall indicate that the written note has been reviewed by the supervising physical therapist and that the content of the note meets standards of practice and is consistent with the plan of care and goals established for the patient. Signing a note does not necessarily demonstrate availability or accountability of the physical therapist. The physical therapist must co-sign every note written by the physical therapist assistant in the medical record even if availability was off-site.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

The Physical Therapy Section of the Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, and Athletic Trainers Board receives several letters each month requesting clarification and interpretation of the laws and rules relating to the practice of physical therapy. These letters typically reflect current issues and problems experienced by licensees in the delivery of service. The Physical Therapy Section can respond to letters that are related to the PT Practice Act.

Following are frequently asked questions and the Section's response. This is by no means a complete list. If you have questions, please do not hesitate to write to the Physical Therapy Section.

- Q.** *Can a physical therapist remove sutures or staples?*
- A.** There is nothing in the PT Practice Act that would prohibit you from removing staples/sutures at the request of the physician referring the patient to your services. As with many procedures, you must demonstrate competency in the performance of this task.
- Q.** *Can unlicensed (supportive) personnel or other assistive physical therapy personnel document in the patient's chart?*

- A.** When other assistive physical therapy personnel are involved in components of a treatment session, they may document only their involvement. Their signature may reflect their training or credentials and shall be countersigned by the supervising physical therapist. When unlicensed (supportive) personnel participate in physical therapy patient care delivery, they must document only their involvement. They shall sign only their name and the note shall be countersigned by the supervising physical therapist.
- Q.** *Does a physical therapist or physical therapist assistant licensure applicant still require direct, on-site supervision or can this person practice independently with a PT co-signing the notes?*
- A.** The licensure applicant is an unlicensed person who, at all times, functions under the on-site supervision of a physical therapist (PT/PTA licensure applicant) or a physical therapist assistant (PTA licensure applicant).

REIMBURSEMENT FOR PHYSICAL THERAPY SERVICES

A number of licensees send correspondence to the Physical Therapy Section with questions about Medicare/Medicaid and other third party payer reimbursement requirement. The Physical Therapy Section regulates and licenses physical therapist and physical therapist assistant professionals. We cannot interpret third party payer requirements or provide advice on reimbursement. We recommend direct communication with third party payers or Medicare intermediaries regarding requirements for reimbursement.

There has also been correspondence about others external to physical therapy billing for/receiving payment for physical therapy services. The Section shares your concerns about the encroachment of others into areas within the scope of physical therapy or that mislead the public. We would encourage you to be active in the professional association and to contact your legislators to share the concerns that you have expressed in your correspondence.

EVALUATIONS, DISCHARGE PLANNING AND SUMMARIES, AND PATIENT ABANDONMENT

There have been a rising number of incidents in which the physical therapist is performing an evaluation of the patient, turning the care over to a physical therapist assistant and terminating their involvement in the care of that patient. PHYSICAL THERAPISTS DO NOT

JUST PERFORM EVALUATIONS ON PATIENTS, REGARDLESS OF THEIR EMPLOYMENT STATUS (full-time/part-time/PRN)

If, for any reason, the evaluating physical therapist, including a therapist who works PRN or part-time, will no longer be available to provide and supervise the physical therapy care, the patient must be transferred by that physical therapist to another physical therapist. Principle 3.3D of the APTA Code of Ethics states, in part, "...In the event of elective termination of a physical therapist/patient relationship by the physical therapist, the therapist should take steps to transfer the care of the patient, as appropriate to another provider." The physical therapist that has accepted the transfer of care is then responsible to supervise all aspects of the physical therapy program that are delegated to physical therapy personnel. If the patient is not transferred to another physical therapist, the evaluating physical therapist is responsible for the overall care of the patient including the supervision of any physical therapy personnel providing services to that patient. It is the position of the Physical Therapy Section that discharge planning and the completion of the discharge evaluation are the responsibility of the supervising physical therapist. Section 4755-27-02 of the Ohio Administrative Code states, in part, that, "...The physical therapist shall perform personally the following activities, which may not be delegated, regardless of the setting in which the service is given: interpretation of physician referrals, initial patient evaluation, initial and ongoing treatment plan of care development, periodic re-evaluation of the patient and adjustment of the plan of care and discharge evaluation. FURTHERMORE, SECTION 4755-27-03(B)(5) STATES THAT PHYSICAL THERAPIST ASSISTANTS ARE NOT QUALIFIED TO PERFORM THE DISCHARGE EVALUATION AND COMPLETE THE FINAL DISCHARGE SUMMARY.

It is the position of the Physical Therapy Section that physical therapist assistants may gather and summarize objective information; however, they cannot interpret this data. It is the responsibility of the physical therapist to interpret and make recommendations for the purpose of discharge development. If there is collaboration between the physical therapist and the physical therapist assistant, this must be reflected in the patient documentation.

The patient is the ultimate responsibility of the evaluating physical therapist. Relying solely on the

information gathered by the physical therapist assistant during treatment does not constitute a reassessment, and may not fulfill the physical therapist's obligation to provide the appropriate standard of care. Likewise, the physical therapist assistant has a legal obligation, in the overall care of the patient, to make sure the review and assessment is performed by the physical therapist to meet the same standard of care.

Principle 3.1 of the APTA Code of Ethics states that, "...Upon accepting an individual for provision of physical therapy services, physical therapists shall assume the responsibility for evaluating that individual; planning, implementing and supervising the therapeutic program; re-evaluating and changing that program; and maintaining adequate records of the case including progress reports."

PROFESSIONAL LIABILITY

Physical therapists and physical therapist assistants must accept responsibility for their actions and judgement, not corporate administrative policy. Any professional practice decision regarding the provision of a physical therapy service rests solely with the physical therapist. These provisions are outlined in the Ohio Laws and Rules Governing the Practice of Physical Therapy, Standard of Care and Code of Ethics Section. Specifically, the Code of Ethics, Principle 3.C, states that, "...regardless of the practice setting, physical therapists shall maintain the ability to make independent judgements."

FAILURE TO RENEW YOUR LICENSE

The Physical Therapy Section of the Board will be taking a stronger stance on those licensees who fail to meet the deadline for license renewal and continue to practice as physical therapists and physical therapist assistants until such time as they receive notification from the Section that they no longer have a current license. To eliminate confusion of licensees and to ensure sufficient time for the Section to complete the renewal process, the dates and deadlines for renewal will be clarified in a general bulletin that will be sent to all licensees.

WHAT IF I AM PRACTICING AS A PHYSICAL THERAPIST OR PHYSICAL THERAPIST ASSISTANT WITH AN EXPIRED LICENSE

If you discover that your license to practice physical therapy has expired, you MUST immediately cease from practicing as a physical therapist or physical therapist assistant. Should you wish to continue to practice in the State of Ohio, you must complete the reinstatement process and be approved by the Board prior to resuming practice. Please be aware that if you

have been working as a physical therapist or physical therapist assistant without a valid license OR supervising a physical therapist assistant without a valid license, you may be subject to an investigation and disciplinary action by the Board.
